some good news for a change of pace.


Recently in the NH House, HB 1589, the bill designed to increase the number of people added to the NIC's prohibited list who have not been adjudicated mentally incompetent, was soundly defeated in committee and marked ITL (Inexpedient to Legislate). NHFC President Jon Evans has been warning all of us about the dangerous anti-gun bill, SB 244. There was a farce of a public hearing at the State House and anti-gun activists were out in force to push this bill. They were even joined by an attorney who claimed to represent firearms manufacturers. Yes, the firearms manufacturers are conspiring with anti-gun activists to take away your Second Amendment rights, based on the subjective opinion of a shrink, to try and placate the government anti-gun machine!

The House and Senate have a long precedent of allowing bill sponsors to testify first, followed by elected State officials, and then followed by citizens. Last to testify have historically been lobbyists who are paid to be there. Unlike the citizens and our almost volunteer state legislature, the lobbyists are on the clock and actually making money while sitting in the hearing room.

Stepping away from a long established tradition of allowing Representatives and Senators with busy schedules to testify first, the Chair called on a lobbyist to follow the bill sponsor, in a coordinated effort to make it appear to the media that there was support for this legislation. The effort was so blatant that others who attend hearings noted the departure from the standard committee practice.

We have also learned that at least one anti-gun group took issue with a recent alert sent by our friends at Gun Owners of America advocating the defeat of SB 244. That alert was written by the





General Counsel to Gun Owners of America, longtime New Hampshire resident, Michael Hammond. Mr. Hammond is a strong supporter and friend of the New Hampshire Firearms Coalition, Inc. and the Gun Owners of NH. Inc.

Penny Dean, the attorney of record of GONH has also reviewed the proposed legislation and agrees that this bill is poorly written and would cause more prob-lems for law-abiding citizens and will do nothing to prevent future tragedies from happening.

Billionaires Bloomberg and Soros are using their vast wealth to undermine our efforts on the state and local levels to advance their firearms confiscation schemes. Confiscation of all firearms is their ultimate goal.

Most of us have local elections this month. Don't be fooled. Protecting our firearms rights starts at the local level. Take the time to find out how your local candidates feel about our firearms rights. Most politicians have ambitions for higher office. We can weed out the bad guys (and gals) before they get powerful enough to threaten our rights in the future.

### John Moses Browning

John Moses Browning (January 23, 1855 – November 26, 1926), born in Ogden, Utah, was an American firearms designer who developed many varieties of military and civilian firearms, cartridges, and gun mechanisms, many of which are still in use around the world. He is arguably the most important figure in the development of modern automatic and semi-automatic firearms and is credited with 128 gun patents. He made his first firearm at age 13 in his father's gun shop, and was awarded his first patent on October 7, 1879 at the age of 24.

Browning influenced nearly all categories of firearms design. He invented or made significant improvements to single-shot, leveraction, and slide-action rifles and shotguns. His most significant contributions were arguably in the area of autoloading firearms. He developed the first autoloading pistols that were both reliable and compact by inventing the telescoping bolt, integrating the bolt and barrel shroud into what is known as the pistol slide. Browning's telescoping bolt design is now found on nearly every modern semi-automatic pistol, as well as several modern fully automatic weapons. He also developed the first gas-operated machine gun, the Colt-Browning Model 1895 - a system that surpassed mechanical recoil operation to become the standard for most high-power self-loading firearm designs worldwide. Browning also made significant contributions to automatic cannon development.

Browning's most successful designs include the M1911 pistol, the Browning Hi Power pistol, the Browning .50 caliber machine gun, the Browning Automatic Rifle, and the Browning Auto-5, a ground-breaking semi-automatic shotgun. These arms are nearly identical today to those assembled by Browning, with only minor changes in detail and cosmetics. Even today, Browning's guns are some of the most copied guns in the world.

Browning was a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and


served a two-year mission in Georgia beginning in March of 1887. His father, Jonathan Browning, who was among the thousands of Mormon pioneers in the mass exodus from Nauvoo, Illinois to Utah, established a gunsmith shop in Ogden in 1852.

John worked in his father's shop from the age of seven, where he

was taught basic engineering and manufacturing principles, and encouraged to experiment with new concepts. He developed his first rifle, a single-shot falling block action design, then founded his own manufacturing operation, in partnership with his younger brother, Matthew Browning, and began to produce this firearm.

Production examples of the Model 1885 rifle caught the attention of the Winchester Repeating Arms Company, who dispatched a representative to evaluate the competition. Winchester bought the design for \$8,000 and moved production to their Connecticut factory. From 1883, Browning worked in partnership with Winchester and designed a series of rifles and shotguns, most notably the lever action Winchester Model 1887 and the Model 1897 pump shotgun, the falling block single shot Model 1885, and the leveraction Model 1886, Model 1892, Model 1894, Model 1895 rifles, as well as the long recoil operated semi-automatic Remington Model 8 rifle, many of which are still in production today in some form. Over seven million Model 1894s have been produced, more than any other centerfire sporting rifle.

Winchester manufactured several popular small arms designed by John Browning. For decades in the late 19th Century-early 20th Century, Browning designs and Winchester firearms were synonymous and the collaboration was highly successful. This came to an end when Browning proposed a new long



recoil operated semiautomatic shotgun design, a prototype finished in 1898, to Winchester management, which ultimately became the Browning Auto-5 shotgun.

As was the custom of the time, Browning's earlier designs had been licensed exclusively to Winchester and other manufacturers for a

single fee payment. With this new product, Browning introduced in his negotiations a continuous royalty fee based upon unit sales, rather than a single front-end payment. If the new shotgun became highly successful, Browning stood to make substantially more income than by the prior license fee arrangements. Winchester management was displeased with the bold change in their relationship, and rejected Browning's offer. Remington Arms was also approached, but the president of Remington died of a heart attack as Browning waited to offer them the gun. This forced Browning to look overseas to produce the shotgun.

Having recently successfully negotiated licenses with Fabrique Nationale of Belgium (FN), Browning took the new shotgun design to them; the offer was accepted and FN manufactured the new shotgun, honoring its inventor, as the Browning Auto-5. The Auto-5 was continuously manufactured as a highly popular shotgun throughout the 20th century.

In response, Winchester shifted its reliance on Browning designs when it adopted a hammerless shotgun design of Thomas Crossley Johnson for the new Winchester Model 12, which was based upon design features of the earlier Browning-designed Winchester Model 1897 shotgun. This shift marked the end of Winchester-Browning collaboration.

Browning soon turned his attention to automatic weapons. The Gatling machine gun (patented in 1862 by Richard Jordan Gatling), was the dominant automatic weapon of the era; it was a rapid-fire gun powered by a hand-operated crank. Browning attempted to find a way of using expanding gases and recoil from exploding ammunition to eject, reload, and fire weapons automatically. From 1889 to 1892, he experimented on the machine gun, finally creating a crude weapon that captured the gases at the muzzle. In 1895, Browning improved the gun by diverting the gases from a hole drilled in the back of the barrel. The resulting weapon was used in the Spanish-American War as well as in the Boxer Rebellion in China.

Browning was also able to employ the same principle for a semi-automatic pistol that became the standard military sidearm for the United States in 1911. A later variation of a heavy machine gun designed by Browning was used aboard US military aircraft, having the ability of firing at the rate of 1,200 shots per minute. In 1918, Browning's machine gun was pronounced the finest in the world: it was water-cooled, mounted on a tripod, and weighed 36 pounds. In one test, this weapon was continuously fired for 48 minutes.

The Colt M1911, Browning 1917/19, and the BAR saw action with US forces in World War I, World War II, and the Korean War, with the Browning M1911 going on to serve as the US standard military sidearm until 1985; a variant is still used by special operations units of the United States Marine Corps, and the design remains very popular among civilian shooters and some police departments. The Browning Hi-Power has a similarly lengthy period of service outside the United States, and remains the standard sidearm of the Australian and Canadian armed forces. The M2 Browning machine gun, (the timeless .50 caliber "Ma-Deuce"), which was developed in 1918, entered service with the US Armed Forces in 1921, and remains in active service with armed



forces across the world in a variety of roles. The M4 cannon, a 37mm autocannon, was initially designed by Browning in 1921, and entered service in 1938; it was used both in aircraft and on US Navy PT boats during WW II.

The premium Browning Superposed shotgun, an over-under design, was his last completed firearm design and possibly his most elegant. It was marketed originally with twin triggers; a single trigger modification was later made by his son, Val. Commercially introduced in 1931 by FN, Browning Superposed shotguns, and their more affordable cousins, the Browning Citori, continue to be manufactured into the 21st Century, and come with varying grades of fine hand engraving and premium quality wood.

John Browning was known as a dedicated and tireless innovator and experimenter who sought breakthrough consumer-oriented features and performance and reliability improvements in small arms designs. He did not retire from his career in his elder years, but dedicated his entire adult life - literally to his last day - to these pursuits. On November 26, 1926, while working at the bench on a self-loading pistol design for Fabrique Nationale, he died of heart failure in the design shop of his son Val A. Browning. Even the 9mm self-loading pistol he was working on when he died had great design merit and was eventually completed in 1935, by Belgian designer Dieudonne Saive. Released as the FN GP35, it was more popularly known as the Browning Hi-Power pistol.

Browning firearms have been made, both licensed and unlicensed, by hundreds of factories around the world. In 1977, Fabrique Nationale acquired the Browning Arms Company which had been established in 1927, the year after Browning's death.

Several of Browning's designs are still in production today. Some of his most notable designs include: Cartridges: .25 ACP, .32 ACP, .38 ACP, 9mm Browning Long, .380 ACP, .45 ACP, and .50 BMG.

Firearms: FN M1899/M1900 (.32 ACP), Colt Model 1900, Colt Model 1902 (.38 ACP), Colt Model 1903 (.38 ACP), FN Model 1903 (.32 ACP, 9mm Browning Long), Colt Model 1903 Pocket Hammerless (.32 ACP), FN Model 1906 Vest Pocket (.25 ACP), Colt Model 1908 Vest Pocket (.25 ACP), Colt Model 1908 Pocket Hammerless (.380 ACP), FN Model 1910 (.32 ACP, .380 ACP), US M1911 pistol (.45 ACP), Browning Hi-Power (9mm Luger), Colt Woodsman pistol (.22 LR), Winchester Model 1885 falling-block single shot rifle, Winchester Model 1886 lever-action rifle. Winchester Model 1887 lever-action shotgun, Winchester Model 1890 slide-action rifle (.22 LR), Winchester Model 1892 lever-action rifle, Winchester Model 1894 lever-action rifle, Winchester Model 1895 lever-action rifle. Winchester Model 1897 pump-action shotgun, Browning Auto-5 long-recoil semi-automatic shotgun, Browning Superposed over/under shotgun, Remington Model 8 semi-auto rifle, Remington Model 17 pump-action shotgun, Browning 22 Semi-Auto rifle (.22 LR), Remington Model 24 semiauto rifle (.22 LR), FN pump-action rifle (.22 LR), US M1895 machine gun, US M1917 machine gun, US M1919 machine gun, US M1918 Browning Automatic Rifle (BAR), US M2 .50caliber heavy machine gun, and the US M4 37mm Automatic Gun.

No design of Browning's had ever proved to be a failure. He invented more successful firearms than any other American: today, there are over thirty million modern weapons which are based on his designs. One measure of Browning's phenomenal success is the fact that no fundamental changes have appeared in the firearms industry since his death in 1926.
